Guidelines for the Development of Self-Feeding Skills

Children with impaired motor skills and/or developmental disabilities may have a harder time learning these skills. Let the child's abilities guide the speed they acquire self-feeding skills and gradually progress from the simpler skills to more complex ones. Fine Motor Skill Interventions for Teaching Handwriting

Handwriting ability primarily involves the use of fine motor skills and a large majority of a student's day, up to 60%, is spent in writing tasks (McHale & Cermak, 1992). Therefore, it is no wonder that children who have underdeveloped or poor use of fine motor skills would struggle with their writing samples (Erhardt & Meade, 2005).
